Domain Name Disputes Continue to Soar



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At the risk of sounding like a broken record, it looks like domain name disputes are on-track for another record year, with the two leading service providers for the Uniform Domain Name Dispute Resolution Policy (UDRP) seeing big increases in the number of cases and domain names they handled in the first quarter of 2021. Specifically:

- At the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO), trademark owners received 788 decisions in the quarter, up from 686 the previous quarter – an increase of 14.9%. And the total number of disputed domain names in those decisions (since many UDRP cases include more than one domain name) rose 28.4%, from 1,232 to 1,582 domain names.
- At the Forum (formerly the National Arbitration Forum), the number of decisions spiked 12.1% (from 436 to 489) and the number of domain names rose 5.5% (from 658 to 694).

In my interview with Renee Fossen at the Forum (see page 9), she tells me one reason that may explain the rise:



The registrations of domain names likely increased during [the pandemic], and there were times where maybe those cybersquatters had more time to actually do their thing and also more time for attorneys to actually track that stuff down and be able to remedy it through the UDRP.

Interestingly, trademark owners are even taking greater advantage of the often-overlooked Uniform Rapid Suspension Systems (URS), with a 6.9% increase in the number of decisions the first quarter of 2021 (see page 7).


Number of UDRP Decisions and Domain Names



WIPO Domain Name Cases by Year



At WIPO, the leading UDRP service provider, the number of domain name disputes is up more than 10% since the beginning of 2020 and, if the trend continues, will set a record for the eighth consecutive year. (Note: Data on this graph includes all domain name dispute policies administered by WIPO, including cases outside of the UDRP, such as ccTLD-specific policies.)

UDRP Outcome




Transfer remains the most popular outcome in UDRP cases, rising from 93.98% in the previous quarter to 96.07% this quarter.

Largest UDRP Cases


Dareos (owner of the VULKAN trademark) was again the filer of the largest UDRP complaint this quarter – and it was also responsible for two of the top 10 biggest complaints. Such large cases are always efficient for trademark owners.

Most Common gTLDs in UDRP Cases




Most Common ccTLDs in UDRP Cases




The list of ccTLDs that most commonly appear in UDRP decisions remained very similar to the previous quarter, although the number of .co domain names increased by 11.4%.

Most Active Trademark Owners (Domain Names in UDRP)





URS or UDRP?


The URS is less expensive than the UDRP, but it does not apply to .com, and it only allows a trademark owner to temporarily suspend (not transfer) a disputed domain name.



URS Outcome


Almost all URS decisions in the quarter were decided in favor of the trademark owners that filed the complaints, with only one decision (for three domain names) in favor of the domain name registrant. In that case, *Informatizacion de Empresas v. Whois Privacy Service*, NAF Claim No. 1925314, the expert wrote: "It is clear that this is far from a simple case and the Parties are entitled to the benefit of a fully pleaded and argued process and therefore Complainant's application must be refused." The decision is a reminder that the URS is not appropriate for all domain name disputes.

Spotlight: Inside the Forum

Amid an ongoing surge in domain name disputes under the Uniform Domain Name Dispute Resolution Policy (UDRP), Doug Isenberg of GigaLaw interviewed Renee Fossen, director of arbitration at the Forum.

Formerly known as the National Arbitration Forum, the Forum is one of the leading providers of domain name dispute services, including under the UDRP.

In this video, Doug and Renee discuss why trademark owners filed a record number of cybersquatting cases at the Forum in 2020, which saw a 16 percent increase in disputes over the previous year.

Despite the arrival of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, "we had the busiest filing year we've ever had since the implementation of the UDRP," Renee tells Doug. "I think that's because some of those industries weren't impacted as much as we thought they would be. We did see a decrease in entertainment industries, fashion, travel. But we saw an increase in filings in financial services, pharmaceuticals and insurance areas."

About Domain Name Disputes and GigaLaw

This report focuses primarily on the Uniform Domain Name Dispute Resolution Policy (UDRP), the ICANN policy that provides trademark owners with an inexpensive and quick legal process to combat cybersquatting. It applies to .com and all of the global or generic top-level domains (gTLDs), as well as about 40 country-code top-level domains (ccTLDs). This report also includes data on the Uniform Rapid Suspension System (URS), a more limited policy that primarily addresses only disputes in the new gTLDs (.aaa to .zuerich) created in recent years.

Doug Isenberg (right), founder of GigaLaw and one of the world's most active domain name attorneys, frequently represents trademark owners under the UDRP, the URS and ccTLD-specific policies. He filed the largest UDRP complaint ever, for more than 1,500 domain names, in 2009. He also serves as a domain name panelist for five of the six UDRP service providers, including the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) and the Forum.
